The CLIDE Awards Program was established in 2003 by the Center of Development Excellence to celebrate regional excellence.

## What is NCTCOG?

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) is a voluntary association of local governments (counties, cities, school districts, special districts) established in 1966 to assist local governments in planning for common needs, cooperating for mutual benefit, and recognizing regional opportunities for improving the quality of life for the citizens of North Central Texas.

In NCTCOG's structure, each member government appoints a voting representative from its governing body. These voting representatives make up the "general assembly" which annually elects the Executive Board, NCTCOG's 13-member policy approval body. The Board is supported by policy development, technical advisory, and study committees as well as a professional staff managed by the chief executive officer, Mike Eastland, Executive Director.

NCTCOG provides technical assistance, planning, training, demographic and economic data, and special services in the functional areas of environmental resources, human services, and transportation, and operates a regional training center, which offers both police and local government professional development training.

North Central Texas is a dynamic 16-county region centered around the two urban centers of Dallas and Fort Worth. The area of the region is approximately 12,800 square miles, (which is larger than nine states in the United States), and the population of the region is approximately 6.5 million. Currently, NCTCOG has 240 member local governments including all 16 counties, 169cities, 24 school districts, and 31 special districts.
